

CAREER & TECH CENTER PARTNERS WITH WJFF TO EXPAND PROGRAMMING, INTERNSHIPS AND FUTURE CAREERS FOR STUDENTS

In 2019-2020, the Career & Tech Center is launching a course in Broadcasting/Music Production to high school students. The program will provide students with hands-on training to learn industry basics in radio and live musical recordings. Students will learn audio production terminology, techniques, and how to operate and maintain audio equipment, and use digital audio workstations to create recordings. To provide students with an optimal learning environment, Sullivan BOCES has partnered with WJFF to locate this new program at the new radio station.

According to Dan Rigney, general manager and development director for WJFF Radio Catskill, "We are thrilled to have this community partnership. It is essentially the kickoff to the project that will bring our new home to Liberty."

WJFF recently acquired the Catskill Harvest building in Liberty and will move from Jeffersonville to Liberty. To prepare for the move, WJFF is working with the Career & Tech Center's Construction Tech Program to convert the existing space into a state-of-the-art



studio, offices, and classroom. The Natural Resources Program will also work with WJFF to transform the property's existing landscaping into an area that will better suit the station's needs.

"We at the Career & Tech Center at Sullivan BOCES are excited about our new partnership with WJFF. We have mutual goals centered on community involvement and improvement, and we are thrilled that we can combine resources to pursue those goals together. The demolition and site work that our students can accomplish for WJFF are the first steps in what we hope to be a long-standing relationship which will include events, programming, internships and future careers for students at Sullivan BOCES," said Scott Palermo, executive principal at the Career & Tech Center.

It was held in the "Well" of the Legislative Office Building. The "Well" is the recessed lobby at the base of the grand stairway that provides access to the Empire State Plaza.

Sullivan BOCES highlighted how Virtual Reality (VR) is used to give our students a visual component to enforce their studies and provide them with "virtual" experiences to expand their knowledge. Not only was our program extremely popular with the elected officials and staff, but students and faculty from the other BOCES could not wait to take part in a virtual experience.

On February 8th, Sullivan BOCES and The Hudson Valley Scholastic Art Affiliates (HVSAA) once again came together to organize and present the Regional 2019 Scholastic Art & Writing Awards. The HVSAA is a consortium of organizations including Dutchess BOCES, Orange-Ulster BOCES, Sullivan BOCES, Ulster BOCES, the Enlarged City School Districts of Middletown, and the Orange County Arts Council.

The Scholastic Arts Awards program allows Hudson Valley students to showcase their talents in the areas of architecture, ceramics, design, painting, illustration, fashion, photography, digital art, mixed media, printmaking, sculpture, and film. "We are so proud of all of the students who submitted artwork this year," said Susan Zieres-Teeple, Arts In Education Coordinator at Sullivan BOCES.

This year, thirty-six different schools and 885 students submitted 3,351 pieces of art. As a result, the Hudson Valley Affiliate awarded 225 Gold Keys, 351 Silver Keys, Honorable Mentions, and American Visions awards. In Sullivan County, eight pieces of art received the gold key award and seven pieces of art earned silver key awards. "I am happy to win two Gold Key awards again this year," said Maria Rakin, Liberty student.



NEW ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE CLASSES MAKE LEARNING EASIER FOR PARENTS

In collaborative with the Liberty Central School, the BOCES Adult & Continuing Education Program opened a new adult English as a Second Language (ESL) course at the Liberty High School. Initially a pilot program, the class was designed to make attending classes as easy as possible. When parents drop their child off at school, they can go directly into class to participate in ESL instruction. The class is open to adults in the community and new students are welcome.

The program has been very successful. In the next couple of weeks, the Adult Program will open an evening class at the Liberty High School to reach another group of individuals that would like to participate in ESL classes. "Holding the course in the school makes it accessible for the parents," said Valeria Henry, ESL instructor at Sullivan BOCES. "My students can attend classes before they go to work and the new evening class will allow people to attend after work."





The Adult Program is also working with the Fallsburg Central School and the Monticello Central School to establish a pilot program in their districts.

"Transportation has always been an issue for many of the people who attend our classes. Opening classes in our schools and at locations throughout our county will help individuals access classes," said Scott Palermo, executive principal of the adult & continuing education program at Sullivan BOCES.
