



Food Service Sanitation [15 hour course]

Applied Food Service Sanitation is designed to assist the manager or potential manager apply sanitation principles in the operation of a food service establishment. Students will learn to identify the causes of food-borne illness, identify and apply correct procedures for cleaning and sanitizing, recognize problems and potential solutions associated with facility, equipment, and layout. The Illinois code related to food service establishments will be discussed. During the last session students will take the Illinois Food Service Certification exam. This class is required for certification as a food service manager. Students receive 1 hour of college credit for successful completion of this course. 





UHot Glass Experience I

Glassblowing is a technique that was invented by the Phoenicians around 3500 years ago; now you will have the opportunity to learn the art of working with studio glass! 
