What is OLLI?

OLLI is the acronym for Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. UNF OLLI provides intellectual, social and cultural enrichment opportunities in a climate that fosters friendship and a mutual sharing of ideas and life experiences. OLLI offers courses, ED-ventures,

Speaker Series programs and other special events. OLLI is a year-round, member-centered,

member-led, member-staffed program for those 50 years and better in Northeast Florida. UNF OLLI enjoys national status as one of 117 college-affiliated OLLIs across the country that receives funding from The Bernard Osher Foundation. To learn more visit www.osherfoundation.org.

How do I become an OLLI member?

You may join online at www.unfolli.com, call our terrific Customer Care Team at (904) 620-4200 or visit our offices at UNF University Center. Your membership is renewable annually from the day you join.

I am an OLLI member. Where are courses offered?

Courses are offered at UNF and three partner sites: Fleet Landing, Glenmoor, and Westminster Woods on Julington Creek. Free parking is provided at all sites. At UNF, classes are held at University Center Building 43. Fleet Landing and Glenmoor are gated communities. Guards at the gates will direct you to the buildings where OLLI events are held. At Westminster Woods, it is best to drive to the Administration Building and allow the receptionist to direct you.

To obtain directions, go online to www.unfolli.com and click on the name of the course. Look for the location and then click the "Map It!" link.

I am not an OLLI member. Is there a way that I can find out if I might like OLLI programs?

Membership is not required to attend OLLI's Speaker Series programs. These are designed to promote awareness of OLLI's programming opportunities in the community.

What are the benefits of an OLLI membership?

Membership is a prerequisite for most but not all OLLI programming. Membership provides access to OLLI courses, OLLI ED-ventures, programs in the Speaker Series and other benefits.

- OLLI courses are offered throughout the year. Members have access to more than 250 courses and ED-ventures annually. Our fall and winter terms are our largest sessions with a current average of 70 courses each. In spring we typically offer between 40 and 50 courses. We publish catalogs for each of the three terms. We have just begun to offer summer courses. These are promoted via www.unfolli.com and e-mail messages sent to all members. Courses can be as short as one session or may span several months. They are offered throughout the week at various times of the day. The Curriculum Team plans and designs the courses for each session.
- OLLI ED-ventures are out-of-classroom learning opportunities. ED-ventures include concerts and trips to area arts, culture, history, scientific, healthcare, government and commercial venues. Often these trips are preceded by one or more lectures to prepare students for the out-of-classroom experience. Occasionally ED-ventures may also provide an opportunity for longer trips away from our area that last several days. The ED-ventures Team develops and coordinates these unique learning opportunities.
- Speaker Series are programs on a variety of interesting topics held each month at UNF and at our partner sites. There is no charge for attendance but reservations are required since there may be space limitations. The Speaker Series Team plans and coordinates these program offerings.

Other benefits provided by OLLI membership include free parking at the UNF University Center, borrowing
privileges at UNF's Carpenter Library, and discounts at UNF's Aquatic Center, GolfPlex and other facilities. In
addition, UNF OLLI promotes free programs of interest to members that are offered by UNF, its partners and by
OLLI's partner sites.

I am interested in teaching a course, proposing a course topic or referring a prospective instructor to OLLI. How can I do that?

OLLI's Curriculum Team plans the courses for each term. There are a variety of ways to communicate your ideas.

If you are enrolled in a course, the evaluation at the end of the session provides an area for your feedback.
