All graduate students must apply for admission through the appropriate college. The admissions process varies with the student's classification.



Student Classifications

Persons registering for courses at Niagara University for the summer session will register under one of the following categories:

Continuing Student

A currently enrolled Niagara University student in either an undergraduate or graduate degree program.

Readmitted Student

A student that was previously admitted to Niagara but stopped attending classes must apply for readmission through the admissions office.

First-time Undergraduate Degree Applicant

An individual seeking undergraduate degree candidacy at Niagara University. Student must be approved by the admissions office.

First-time Graduate Degree Applicant

An individual seeking graduate degree candidacy at Niagara University. An application for admission must be submitted to and approved by the dean of the respective graduate school of interest.

Nonmatriculated Student

Person enrolling in courses for credit, but not seeking a degree from the university.

High School Senior Status

High school students completing their sophomore year may enroll for a maximum of six semester hours of credit during the summer session in courses not requiring prerequisites. Students are charged a reduced tuition rate and must present the completed Application for Admission Special High School Program form to the Continuing Education Office. This form is available in the Continuing Education Office Dunleavy 103 and does require the approval of the principal and/or guidance counselor.

Canadian Student Registration

Canadian citizens interested in attending Niagara University must apply and be accepted into a degree program. All Canadian students must complete documentation to apply for an I-20 document. The applications are available at www.niagara.edu/international. Further information and instructions will be made available upon a student's application for admission. This school is authorized under federal law to enroll nonimmigrant students.

Summer Course Withdrawal Procedure

Students registered for undergraduate or graduate course may adjust their summer schedule anytime after registering up to and including the first class meeting (per session). Students who registered via their WebAdvisor account can make the adjustments through WebAdvisor. All adjustments must be done through the Records office with an add/drop form from their advisors. Persons withdrawing from a course after the second class meeting will receive a grade of W on their transcripts and will be refunded according to the tuition refund policy.

Students withdrawing from a course must obtain permission from the faculty member of the course they want to withdraw. The faculty member must complete the Withdrawal From Course form attesting to the academic status of the student, i.e. passing or failing. If the student is passing the course, a grade of W will be entered on his/her transcript. Should the student be failing the course, a grade of F will be entered on his/her transcript. The Withdrawal From Course form must have the signature of both the course faculty member and the dean of the appropriate program of study.

Financial Assistance

Niagara University believes it offers an education that provides students with the opportunity to grow intellectually, socially, and morally. While the costs at independent colleges are higher than at state supported schools, Niagara has attempted to control costs as much as possible while still offering a stimulating academic and social environment. Niagara has made every effort to assist students by offering many types of financial aid programs.

To apply for student aid, a student must:

- 1) Apply for admission. An application for admission may be obtained from your guidance counselor or from the admissions office at Niagara University.
- 2) Be accepted by the committee on admissions as a matriculated student. Criteria for acceptance are described in the admissions policy section of the undergraduate catalog.
- 3) Be a U.S. citizen or eligible U.S. noncitizen (federal definition) and be enrolled at least half time to receive financial aid, including NU grants and scholarships.
- 4) File a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by Feb. 15 for incoming students, March 15 for returning students. This form is available in the financial aid office, or apply online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.
- 5) Submit the NU Summer School Application for Financial Assistance. This form is available in the financial aid office.

A statement of policy on financial aid eligibility for students interested in studying abroad is available in the financial aid office, as well as with the study-abroad adviser. You must be registered for at least six credit hours to be considered for any Niagara University financial aid.

Tuition Reimbursement

Many employers offer tuition reimbursement as a benefit to their employees. Niagara offers payment plans to these benefit-eligible employees. Students should check with their human resources offices to see if they are eligible, and contact Niagara's student accounts office at 716-286-8300 for policies and procedures.

Tuition Refund Policy

The date used to calculate a student's refund is the last date of attendance in class. This date must be verified by the instructor and noted on the withdrawal form or drop slip. Students can coordinate their official withdrawal via their dean's office. Failure to attend class or informing a course instructor does not constitute an official withdrawal.

The University

Niagara University is an independent, coeducational institution in the Vincentian tradition, incorporated under the authority of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York and accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges. The Ontario Ministry of Education has granted ministerial consent to the College of Education to conduct graduate education courses in Ontario, Canada. The College of Education, graduate and undergraduate, is fully accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

Location

Niagara is located on Route 104, at the northern limits of Niagara Falls, N.Y. The campus runs along the top of the picturesque Monteaale Ridge of the Niagara River gorge about four miles from world-famous Niagara Falls. Niagara is easily accessible via the New York State Thruway, Niagara Section, and is centrally located for bus and airline transportation.

The library's collection consists of 200,000 books and 22,000 periodical titles in print and electronic formats. We also offer a recreational collection with entertaining novels and DVDs. Your university ID card is your library card, and you may borrow and keep out 25 books at a time. The library maintains a computer training lab on the basement level. When it is not being used for training purposes, it is available for you to work individually using library databases, the Internet or Microsoft Office. There are additional computers throughout the building you can also use. Black and white and color printers are available. You can also borrow a laptop or bring your own to the library and connect to the wireless campus network.

Supervised residence facilities are available for both men and women including graduate and undergraduate students. Residence facilities on campus are also available for male and female members of religious communities. Students currently attending Niagara University should make their reservations for summer living accommodations with the residence life office prior to the start of the summer session. Reservations will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis. (Signing of a residence hall agreement will be required.)

RESIDENCE HALLS

Due to various programs being conducted by the university in the residence halls during the summer, it is necessary that students create an atmosphere conducive to study. Radios, TVs and stereos must be used in moderation and with the room door closed. One or two individuals assigned by the residence life office to supervise the hall are on duty each night to assist the resident students. Community advisors are required to supervise the living conditions and operations of the residence hall and are responsible for proper adherence to university policies.

SCHEDULE OF ARRIVAL

All resident students are requested to arrive on campus between the hours of 1 p.m. and 4 p.m. on the day prior to the start of classes. Students will report directly to their assigned residence hall as posted at the housing office in O'Shea Hall.

BULLETIN BOARDS

All official notes are placed on bulletin boards located on the occupied floors of residence halls as well as on the residence life office bulletin board located in O'Shea Hall.

CARE OF ROOMS AND FACILITIES

Rooms are furnished with a bed, desk, and wardrobe. Students must bring their own blankets, linen, and clothes hangers. Students are responsible for the cleaning of their own rooms. (No maid service is provided). Residential rooms and facilities are subject to regular inspection. The university reserves the right to enter a student's room for inspection, repair, or maintenance.

LIFE EXPERIENCE (PORTFOLIO) PROGRAM

Contact the dean of your program

The Life Experience Program provides a way for adult undergraduate students to translate their experiences to college credit through completion of a life experience portfolio. Credits awarded are not a value judgment of the student's experience but rather; reflect an evaluation of the similarity of those learning experiences to learning that typically occurs through study in the university. Within the first three semesters of academic work at Niagara, students over the age of 25 must make application for this credit option with their respective dean.

Open 24 hours a day

The campus safety office is open year-round to serve the entire campus community. It provides liaison with hospital, fire and police services, coordinates crime prevention programs on campus, and administers the automobile policies.

To ensure the efficient use of university parking lots, it is required that all vehicles operated on campus be registered with the campus safety office.

Parking permits must be affixed to vehicles upon issuance. Students are expected to become familiar with university parking regulations, especially winter emergency and snow removal procedures. Fines for parking and other vehicle violations, as well as towing charges, can be levied and added to the student's account. All visitors to the campus are requested to obtain a daily parking pass at the campus safety office.
